

RIPARIAN/WETLAND

Quaking Aspen: 6-12 inches
Average height is 30-50 feet. A picturesque, fast growing native tree, extremely hardy. Adapts to variable soil texture, but must have moist soil to grow well. Green heart-shaped leaves flutter in the slightest breeze and turn yellow in the fall. Good for riparian, ornamental, and wildlife uses.

*Fire resistant

Redosier Dogwood: 12-24 inches
Average height is 6-15 feet. Colorful, multi-stemmed native shrub that grows moderately fast. Has a reddish to purple stem color from fall to spring. White flowers in the summer are followed by white berries that are eaten by wildlife. Grows well in moist soils that are not saturated all year long. Good for riparian, ornamental, and wildlife user.

*Fire resistant

Yellow Willow: 36 inch cuttings
Average height is 10-20 feet. This native, multi-stemmed large shrub to small tree has yellow stems on new growth, lance shaped leaves, and attractive, smooth gray bark on mature branches. Yellow Willow grows rapidly and can form thickets if planted close together. It is adapted to coarse, medium and fine textured soils as long as there is abundant moisture during the growing season, and can tolerate moderate shade. A good, small tree for riparian plantings next to water, but can also be planted on uplands if irrigated.

Fire resistant plants do not readily ignite from a flame or other ignition sources when they are healthy and well maintained with proper watering and pruning.

ORNAMENTAL

Common Purple Lilac: 12-18 inches
Average height is 8-15 feet. This long lived, large shrub has dense foliage and spreads by shallow underground roots. Common Lilac is adapted to most soil textures and is drought tolerant once established. Fragrant lavender to purple flowers arrive in May. Excellent for ornamental users. Can be used for hedges or field windbreaks but is sensitive to 2, 4-D sprays.

Oregon Holly Grape: Large plugs
Average height is 3 to 5 feet tall, but can grow as tall as 8 feet. This upright species of Oregon Grape is native to the higher precip, forested areas in northern Lincoln County. This hardy shrub has shiny, thorny leaves and clusters of yellow flowers, followed by small, blue berries (grapes) that are eaten by wildlife. Oregon Grape is adapted to coarse and medium textured soils, is tolerant of shade and can be drought tolerant once established. The large plugs have a good root mass that will help increase survivability with adequate watering. A good native shrub for ornamental plantings, ground cover and wildlife.

*Fire resistant
Selkirk Crabapple: 12-18 inches
Average height is 15-25 feet. This hardy, small tree has a moderate growth rate, is adapted to coarse and medium textured soils, and grows best on moist, fertile soils with full sun. The new foliage is a glossy, reddish green that fades to a bronze green in the summer. The showy, dark purplish pink flowers in spring are followed by small, purplish red fruits that are eaten by birds and other wildlife. A good ornamental and wildlife tree.

*Fire resistant
White Rugosa Rose: 12-18 inches
Average height is 4-6 feet. This hardy, multi-stemmed rose was introduced from NE Asia. It has densely prickled stems, large, thick leaves, large white blossoms 2-3 inches in diameter, and large red rose hips 1/2 to 1 inch in diameter. Grows best on sandy, coarse textured soils or medium textured silt loam soils. It will tolerate some soil alkalinity, is drought tolerant once established, but will not tolerate wet soils. Excellent ornamental and can be used for hedges and wildlife.

CONIFERS

Austrian Pine: 6-12 inches
Average height is 30-60 feet. Dense, fast growing, pyramid shaped tree with long, dark green needles. Adaptable to wind and cold. Drought tolerance is medium. Good for windbreaks, landscaping, or Christmas trees.

Blue Spruce: 9-12 inches
Average height is 40-60 feet. Blue Spruce is native to western North America. This pyramid shaped tree with short, prickly blue-green needles can be used in windbreaks, landscaping, or as Christmas trees.

Douglas Fir: 9-18 inches
Average height is 40-100 feet. *Native* Rocky Mountain/Blue Douglas Fir variety for greater winter hardiness and drought tolerance. This large, moderately fast growing tree has pyramidal shape and grows well on steeper north slopes. Requires more moisture and tolerates shade better than Ponderosa Pine. An important timber tree for lumber and firewood. Good for ornamental, windbreak, reforestation, Christmas tree, and wildlife uses.

Ponderosa Pine: 6-12 inches
Average height is 40-100 feet. Broad, open cone-shaped tree with long, stiff, green needles. This *native* pine has a moderate growth rate, needs full sun for best growth, is good for wildlife, and is drought resistant. Withstands hot, dry sites. Seed is collected from trees in the Cheney area. *Fire resistant when pruned to 15-20 feet above the ground.

Rocky Mountain Juniper: 6-12 inches
Average height is 15-25 feet. Native to Western North America. A small to medium sized pyramid shaped tree. Drought tolerant once established. Grows well in moist, well-drained soils and tolerates saline soils, salt and high pH. Good for wildlife, windbreaks, and landscaping.



HEDGES & CONSERVATION

Blue Elderberry: 12 + inches
Average height is 10-25 feet. *Native*, multi-stemmed shrub with rapid growth rate. Drought tolerant once established. Has clusters of white flowers followed by blue berries, ripening in late summer that can be used for wine, jam, syrup, and pies. Good for wildlife and windbreaks.

Caragana: 12-18 inches
Average height is 5-15 feet. Drought tolerant, long lived, alkaline tolerant. This shrub is native to Siberia. It is a dense, attractive, multi-stemmed shrub. Is able to withstand extreme cold and dryness. Yellow flowers in May attract birds and bees. Song birds nest in this shrub. Excellent shrub for windbreaks.

Chokecherry: 12-18 inches
Average height is 10-25 feet. *Native* drought and heat tolerant shrub. Has fragrant, white flowers with red to purple fruit that is good for jelly, syrup, and wildlife. Good autumn color and good for wildlife and windbreaks. *Fire resistant

Golden Currant: 12-24 inches
Average height is 5-10 feet. This *native*, multi-stemmed shrub has clusters of bright yellow, fragrant flowers and black, orange or reddish black berries that attract birds, people, and wildlife. Yellowish to red fall foliage. The sweet and flavorful fruit is popular for jams, jellies, and pies. Good for wildlife and windbreaks. *Fire resistant

Serviceberry: 12-18 inches
Average height is 10-20 feet. Hardy, medium to tall multi-stemmed *native* shrub. Small, white flowers followed by edible, dark purple fruit. Likes full sun to partial shade. Good for wildlife and windbreaks. *Fire resistant

Wood's Rose: 12-24 inches
Average height is 3-6 feet. This *native*, fast growing and hardy rose spreads by shallow roots to form dense thickets. The small, 1 inch diameter pink to red flowers in late May are followed by red rose hips up to 1/2 inch in diameter that persist on the shrubs into winter. The stems have moderate-sized, straight prickles. Wood's Rose is adapted to medium and coarse textured soils, a wide range of soil moisture conditions, and can tolerate some shade. An excellent native shrub for hedges, windbreaks, wildlife, and ornamental uses. *Fire resistant.

SHADE

Littleleaf Linden: 12-18 inches
Average height is 30-45 feet. This moderately fast growing tree has a pyramidal crown when young that becomes dense and more rounded when mature. Littleleaf Linden has distinctive heart shaped leaves. The small, fragrant, white to yellow flowers, which are preferred by bees and other pollinators, are followed by a small nut like fruit. Littleleaf Linden is a good urban street tree and shade tree, and can also be used for windbreaks and wildlife.

Northern Red Oak: 12-18 inches
Average height is 60-80 feet. This hardy, moderately fast growing oak has a broad rounded crown and is native to the eastern United States. The dark, glossy green leaves are 5 to 8 inches long, have sharp pointed lobes and turn red in the fall. The acorns are up to 1 inch long, have reddish brown caps, take two years to mature and trees typically are 20-25 years old before acorns are produced. Grows best in moist, well drained soils and does not tolerate saline or high pH soils well. Good for shade trees and wildlife. *Fire resistant

Thornless Honeylocust: 12-18 inches
Average height is 30-50 feet. This moderately fast growing tree has an open, spreading crown 25 to 40 feet wide. The small green leaflets emerge late in spring after the last killing frost, produce light, filtered shade, and typically require minimal raking. Thornless Honeylocust is adaptable to a wide range of soil textures, tolerates alkaline soil conditions and urban growing conditions, but is tolerant of shade and should be on sites with full sun. The seedlings were propagated from seed and may be male or female plants. The female plants produce seed pods up to 8 inches long. A good shade tree for cities and for lawns where light, filtered shade is desired. *Fire resistant
